Adolescents and Medicine Abuse

NATIONAL MEDICINE ABUSE AWARENESS MONTH – AUGUST 2008

(Newark, NJ) – The New Jersey Poison Control Center (NJPIES) recognizes August as National Medicine Abuse Awareness Month. In response to a nationwide problem, Senators Joseph R. Biden, Jr. (D-Del.) and Charles E. Grassley (R-Iowa) sponsored resolution S.Res. 614; encouraging parental and community awareness of *the intentional abuse of prescription and over-the-counter medicines*. The measure calls for active community involvement to educate parents about the dangers of prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) medicine abuse among teens.

“The use of OTC cough and cold preparations by adolescents in search of a “cheap and legal high” has reached near epidemic proportions,” states Steven M. Marcus, MD, Pediatrician, Medical Toxicologist and Medical Director of NJPIES. “Almost daily, the center is consulted on such cases. Over the past 8 years, New Jersey has experienced a steady increase in unintentional poisoning deaths. Currently, the number of deaths related to unintentional poisonings exceeds those of homicides and are quickly approaching the death rates associated with motor vehicle accidents in the state” said Dr. Marcus.

The poison center has launched a study group charged with addressing the issues of unintentional deaths related to poisonings. By calling attention to this national problem, NJPIES hopes to encourage health professionals to educate their communities about the serious and life-threatening consequences of abusing prescription and over-the-counter medicines.
