

**SUMMARY OF:  
TOWNSHIP OF BLOOMFIELD  
MASTER PLAN KICKOFF WORKSHOP  
SATURDAY, MAY 13, 2023**

This document provides a summary of the proceedings and results of the Township of Bloomfield Master Plan Kickoff Workshop, which took place on May 13, 2023 in the Council chambers 1 Municipal Plaza, Bloomfield. The purpose of the workshop was to introduce the community to the new Master Plan development process, and to provide a public forum for residents to provide suggestions and feedback to help guide the development of the Master Plan.

**Proceedings of the Master Plan Kickoff Workshop**

The workshop consisted of four main sections.

1. Introduction

- Remarks by Mayor Michael J. Venezia
- Presentation by Paul A. Phillips, AICP, PP, from the planning consulting firm of Phillips Preiss Grygiel Leheny Hughes, LLC.

2. Breakout Group Session

- Participants were randomly assigned into one of 6 Breakout Groups and asked to discuss 5 questions.
- Each group was asked to elect one Chairperson to serve as the facilitator;
- Each group was asked to elect one Recording Secretary to take notes of the discussion in each group.

3. Report Back Session

- All participants were brought back from the Breakout Groups.
- The Recording Secretary of each Breakout Group provided summaries of responses to each question of their respective groups.

4. Public Q&A

- The planning consultant team answered questions from residents.

## Summary of resident responses from the Breakout Groups

The following sections detail the responses to the 5 questions given by each Breakout Group, as recorded by the Recording Secretaries of each group and shared during the Report Back Session. A summary of the most common topics/issues mentioned by participants are also provided for each question. Note that the Breakout Groups were listed chronologically from 1 to 6.

### 1. *What are Bloomfield's greatest assets and strengths?*

## 2. *What are the most pressing **issues** Bloomfield faces **now**?*

### MOST COMMONLY MENTIONED ACROSS GROUPS

- Separation between North Side and South Side
- Need more diverse and more affordable housing, specifically for seniors
- Traffic congestion
- Need for improved, safer pedestrian and cyclist circulation
- Maintenance and capacity of infrastructure including water, sewer, and stormwater management, especially in light of recent major storms (e.g., Hurricane Ida)
- Pest control and code enforcement
- Sustainability: need composting, better recycling, renewable energy, etc.

### GROUP 1

- Infrastructure: water main breaks as example
- Disaster preparedness related to flooding—Hurricane Ida as an example
- As more people move here schools may become crowded
- Lack of affordable housing as most new developments seem to be “luxury.”
- Pedestrian safety- Broad Street, specifically; Need better traffic control
- Health of street trees including trees on the Green
- Crime: stealing catalytic converters, shoplifting
- Traffic circulation: too much traffic, speeding, poor traffic flow
- Pest control: more rats, lantern flies, invasive species
- Public transit, specifically bus schedules now that Decamp has shut down service.
- Streets need to be repaved
- Separation between North side of town and South side of town

### GROUP 2

- Traffic congestion; serious potholes
- Taxes are high
- PSE&G does not clean up
- Pedestrian and bike safety
- South End- no parking decks especially in winter
- Composting

- Township not zoned for stormwater runoff- need other emergency solutions
- Zoning Board of Adjustment too overwhelmed
- Downtown is not attractive: no performing arts, etc.
- Solar (issue with squirrels needs to be addressed)
- Developers should be required to dedicate green space

### GROUP 3

- Resilience against climate change (specifically vulnerable populations and small businesses)
- Lack of playable sports fields for youth (who's responsible? How to own the issue with multiple stakeholders?)
- More retail business- too many empty stores (mutual benefit for surrounding communities; education on entrepreneurship; can Bloomfield do a better job promoting itself?)
- Stormwater management
- North end vs. South end: vast differences/disparities
- Composting/food waste opportunities
- Rats
- Drinking water quality

### GROUP 4

- Water quality issues and stormwater mitigation
- Overdevelopment in areas without a plan
- Conflict and divide between North and South sides (lack of language accessibility; separate resources and housing opportunities)
- Friction between industrial and residential land uses in South side.
- Historic preservation (development should be balanced)

- State of infrastructure? Is there enough?
- Industrial, commercial landlords

### GROUP 6

- Differentiation in care in different areas in town
- Open space/natural environment is dwindling
- Sustainability: need better recycling; investment in renewable energy
- Need to better preserve history of town
- Better integration with other towns
- Under utilized areas
- Need a community center

- Susceptible to flooding: what has been done about this issue?

### 3. *What might be the biggest challenges in the next 5-10 years?*

#### MOST COMMONLY MENTIONED ACROSS GROUPS

- Preparation of infrastructure for climate change and major storms
- Keeping Bloomfield an affordable place to live, specifically for existing residents
- Traffic congestion
- Amount of parking
- Better and safer pedestrian and bike circulation

#### GROUP 1

- Availability of affordable housing
- Crowded schools
- Balance of services and infrastructure with development
- Climate change planning
- Water infrastructure and safety
- Amount of parking
- Public transit
- Gentrification and immigration (specifically, language accessibility)

#### GROUP 2

- Improvement of open space
- Sustainability: composting, solar, etc.
- How do you balance and address sometime conflicting goals of younger and older residents; developers and people
- Better bike and pedestrian safety with safe and accessible bike lanes, pedestrian routes
- School population is growing
- What to do about middle school on Franklin Street [i.e., South Junior High School]
- Address needs of geriatric population
- Improvement of downtown area (better quality stores, performing arts spaces)
- Infrastructure needs improvement: traffic management and stormwater management

4. *In the next 5-10 years, my vision for Bloomfield is...? I want Bloomfield to have...?*

#### MOST COMMONLY MENTIONED ACROSS GROUPS

- More spaces for art and culture (performing art spaces, movie theaters, etc.)
- A leader in sustainability (more clean and solar energy, composting, etc.)
- Safe circulation for cyclists and pedestrians (optimize Essex-Hudson Greenway)
- Thriving and more attractive commercial areas with diversity of businesses
- More green space

#### GROUP 1

- Clean and solar energy
- Composting and other environmentally sustainable measures
- More space and activities for teens
- More ADA accessibility
- Greater emergency support and preparedness
- More spaces for arts and culture: theater, performing art space

- Make civic engagement more accessible including zoom and hybrid meetings

- More attractive downtown area with restaurants, theater/performing arts spaces; open spaces

- More ethnically and culturally integrated amenities for all segments of Bloomfield with equal investment in all areas
- More innovative inter-town transportation
- Secure sources of revenue for town grants

- An infrastructure engineering and philosophy that supports walkability and cycling so become less reliant on cars
- Equity in development, seeing expansion happened proportionally across town. Additional housing, commercial, parking, etc. in all neighborhoods not targeting a specific area for ease of availability. Walkability and ease of access should be town wide.
- More green space in town enter and laws protection the space between multi-unit residential and single family homes. Township should move more towards bike lanes and making use of Essex-Hudson Greenway
- Must preserve a unique suburban atmosphere
- Expand green areas and historic district
- A clean town with adequate housing

#### MOST COMMONLY MENTIONED ACROSS GROUPS

- Want improvements to streetscape and aesthetics of new development
- Want better communication between Township and residents

#### GROUP 1

- Want better streetscaping and walkability, particularly on the south side.
- Want more support for civic engagement; improved communication between Township and residents
- Balance development: zoning changes to separate residential and non-residential areas

#### GROUP 2

- Support pool construction
- Better communication between Township and citizens (eg: Clear and Strong; mailers, etc.)
- Town is dirty
- Mental health
- Make PSE&G accountable for cleaning up after itself
- Look forward to brighter, better future

#### GROUP 3

- Bloomfield Green Line (Essex-Hudson Greenway); parking for people out of town?
- Keep Bloomfield affordable
- Brownfields redevelopment
- Need standards for redevelopment that considers environmental impacts
- Microforest (see Environmental Commission)

- Bloomfield Avenue needs improvement (no trees; parkway views to town could be more appealing)
- We don't need more fast food in town; can we encourage other options instead?
