D. Sub-Committee

1. Facilities

– Little League Request – 50/70 Felton

- Director Scurman stated the league requested making Vassar clay a 50/70 field. The committee had reservations about making Vassar Clay a 50/70 field being so close to the turf field. The committee suggestion exploring Felton Clay. He did meet with a field contractor, they are under State contract, and they are in the works of giving a quote to extend the clay, skim the pitcher's mound, add a new home plate and bases, and do some other field work. Director Scurman already has some quotes from a fencing company under State contract to improve the back stop and some other areas. Once he gets a full cost estimate of that he will bring it to the committee.

- Pickle Ball – Temporary courts at Pulaski & Clarks Pond South

- Director Scurman stated they are in the 4th quarter of their budgeting, so he is going out and soliciting quotes for temporary pickle ball nets (economy, middle of the road and high end). He stated we have not had great success with economy. He is also going to have a paint striping company come out and give an estimate. He will get a proposal together and add this to the 2026 operating budget and/or capital.

- DPW Request for a “Field List”

- Director Scurman stated he met with the DPW Director and he would like to get some of the preparation for the little league fields done in the fall and winter so he requested a report earlier this year.

2. Analytics – Met with Carteret Principal and HSA – Nov 5th Meeting

- Director Scurman stated he contacted the Carteret Principal and the Home and School, and met with them to let them know the committee is committed to increasing participation throughout the town. He showed them the analytics and tried to talk to them about the registration numbers, and they think flyers would be a good communication tool for their community.

3. Awards/Community Engagement – Past Commissioners & 2026 Awards

- Director Scurman stated he knows they have spoken about this and want to recognize some of the past members, Dina went through from 2020 on and broke down members that have volunteered and no longer on the committee. He then stated there were about 7 or 8 of them they would like to invite to the December holiday meeting, reconnect and give out a certificate, or small plaque, etc. Dina will go as far back as to 2015 to see which members served 10 plus years.

4. Summer of Fun – 2026 Bands

- Committee member Williams stated she already has some potential bands. The New York Bee Gees, they may be a bit more expensive, but she thinks it'll bring a crowd and they perform around NJ as well as the Bruno Mars cover band. She

also stated she found 2 laser companies and they do a laser show. Director Scurman asked Committee member Williams to email him the information on the bands and laser light show so he can look into it.

5. Cultural Affairs – Public Art Mural – Broad St & 20 Dodd St – See Packet

- Committee Member Arvelo stated the Dodd street mural is too busy. He contacted the artist and told him its too much, less is best, and to use some of the images. The artist went with the fireworks, Oakeside and Juneteenth images. Director Scurman stated the artist did send a new image around 1:30pm that day, and he will share it with the Committee.
- Committee Member Williams stated they were thinking of bringing back “Taste of Bloomfield”. They were thinking of 3 potential locations; 1455 Broad St (UTI), Oakview and/or Demarest school if the BOE would let them. She would like to invite Glenridge too since they are their neighbors. Focusing on storefronts, although they might do a limited number of food trucks, but they really want storefronts and see how those numbers go around May on a weekend. She then stated it would be more focused on adults, charging around \$20/\$25, and wants to know if they would be able to sell beer or wine. Director Scurman stated they can do that since they do it at Harvest Fest, but in the parks and BOE facilities they do not allow alcohol. They have had people get an ABC license that would have to be shown to the Police Department, Clerk and approval by the Mayor and Council and there has to be certain rules and regulations by doing that such as how are they going to make sure everyone is 21, and there are a lot of regulations around that. He then stated he is not sure the BOE ever deviates from that, but knows the township has. Committee Member Williams expressed this is an adult event, 18 and older.
- Director Scurman stated the art muralist is working underneath the Broad St bridge, has made tremendous progress considering all the rain they had.

6. Veteran Affairs – Hometown Hero Banners – See Packet

- Director Scurman stated he has 52 banners in his possession, and DPW will put them up starting on the corner of Hoover all the way down to the front of the high school. He then stated traditionally the Veteran’s Day parade starts at Town Hall, walks down Franklin, and stops at Liberty and Broad in front of the monument. He is trying to think of a way they could have it where they walk down Broad St where the banners are, and since Rami from Town Pub offers a free luncheon for the veterans, he was thinking of walking from Brookside park up Hoover down to Town Pub and do a small reception there. He would like to invite family members that did a banner for their loved ones.

He then stated his concern is since he was not there when it was buried he does not know what it was buried in. He is proposing they ask DPW to dig it up, video tape it with WBMA tv, take pictures, and see how it is built and constructed not what's in it.

§ 399-8. Prohibited acts.

A. It shall be unlawful for any person to utter any profane, threatening or abusive language or loud outcry, perform any obscene or indecent act, commit any nuisance, solicit any contribution or subscription or play any game of chance in any park within the Township or bring into such park any instrument of chance or gambling whatsoever.

B. It shall be unlawful for any person owning, harboring, keeping or in charge of any animal to cause, suffer or allow such dog or cat to soil, defile, defecate on or commit any nuisance on any Township Park athletic fields, athletic courts, or playground areas.

a. Any person owning, harboring, keeping or in charge of any animal which soils, defiles, defecates on or commits any nuisance on any Township Park athletic fields, athletic courts, or playground areas shall immediately remove all feces deposited and shall be subject to all provisions of § 134-10 of this Code.

C. Pursuant to § 134-12 of this Code, it shall be unlawful for any dog or cat, whether licensed or not, to run at large on any Township Park athletic fields, athletic courts, or playground areas. A dog or cat shall be deemed to be running at large when off the premises of its owner or of the person keeping or harboring such dog or cat, which dog or cat is not on a leash, tether, chain, rope or the like, the overall length of which, including the hand grip, shall not exceed six feet, held by its owner or other person able to control such dog or cat.

D. Any dog or cat off the premises of the owner or of the person keeping or harboring the dog or cat which the Animal Control Officer of the Township or their agent has reason to believe is a stray dog or cat, and any dog or cat without a current registration tag on its collar, may be subject to impoundment in accordance with § 134-15 of this Code.

I did some investigation with the help of the library and found out some more details on the time capsule buried in front of town hall.

Please see the attached newspaper article depicting the location, the contents and the type of capsule.

After speaking with DPW and you this is what I was thinking:

1. During the regular work day I ask DPW to dig down to find the capsule. We identify its exact location and assess whether the time capsule is in good condition or not. We cover it back up.
2. We then have a formal public event where residents can come see the capsule being dug up and taken out of the ground.

- If we wanted to open it up and unveil what is inside right then and there we can do that in front of town hall or inside town hall (if the weather is bad).

- If we don't want to do it all in one shot we can just unearth it, keep it at town hall and open it up before the December 8th Council Meeting. The capsule could be opened by the Mayor and take out the contents on live TV via WBMATV. We can then keep the contents on display at town hall and then move them to a more suitable location for review for a period of time.

At some point I think we should give the capsule and the contents to the Historical Society.

Schools super to get new contract

The Board of Education voted unanimously last week to rescind the final two years of Schools Superintendent Thomas Dowd's five-year contract and offer him a new multi-year pact.

Board President Gregg Burnett, who moved the resolution, said that the action was being done to keep the school district's leadership stable.

He said that the vote was not

a reaction to any offers Dowd had received from other school districts.

Dowd was hired as superintendent at \$120,000 per year in August 1998, when he signed a contract that extends through June 30, 2003. He succeeded Leonard Elovitz.

Dowd had been a teacher at Berkeley School and principal at Carteret School over a 25-year span with the Bloomfield district before leaving in 1996 to become schools superintendent in Harrington Park.

Burnett said that the board's action was taken "in light of

Dowd's time and energy invested into the district."

He said that the board's vote voided Dowd's terms of employment effective from July 1, 2001, through June 30, 2003, and would be beginning negotiations immediately on the terms of a new contract.

Dowd said he was "pleasantly surprised" by the action.

"I don't know what to say, and that doesn't happen too often," he told the board.

"I want to say thanks to the board for its vote of confidence and its recognition of the time and energy I've invested in the district. It means a lot to me," Dowd said.

The district is currently conducting \$13.7 million in school expansion projects and is considering additional projects.

Year 2000 won't be forgotten

Time capsule at Town Hall will be opened in 25 years

What will people in the year 2025 be remembering about this year in Bloomfield?

Aside from the closest presidential election that anyone can remember and the "Subway Series" between the New York Mets and the New York Yankees, Bloomfielders a quarter-century from now may be remembering the "Just Say No" anti-drug banners sprinkled around town.

They might remember the first "Peace and Unity" ecumenical march, or they might remember the efforts of the Watsessing Heights area residents to improve their neighborhood.

At least those townspeople who are still around when officials open a time capsule buried on Saturday on the front lawn of the municipal building should recall those things - because artifacts in the capsule will remind them.

Memorabilia for the time capsule were collected over the last two weeks at the office of Mayor John Bukowski and the Township Council and were inserted in a 2 1/2-foot-high airtight container.

By the time officials had ceremoniously lowered the capsule into a pre-dug hole, it contained items submitted by municipal departments and commissions, clubs, organizations, newspapers, the Board of Education, a church and Mayor Bukowski himself.

Among the items were:

- A photo album submitted by Assemblywoman Marion Crecco, R-34, containing memorabilia and newspaper clippings.

- A poster from the first "Peace and Unity" ecumenical march, sponsored by the Bloomfield Commission on Civil and Human Rights.

Council targets area in Center for revitalization

Area for future redevelopment includes 67 properties near NJ Transit train station

Concurring with a Dec. 5 recommendation by the Planning Board, the Township Council on Monday designated 67 properties in Bloomfield Center as a redevelopment area.

The unanimous action was taken after a township consultant told council members that several developers had submitted proposals to overhaul the downtown area, and that those would be discussed before the council in January.

The Planning Board had recommended that the council create a special improvement district (SID) in the Center.

The district is bordered by Bloomfield Avenue on the north, a former warehouse on Washington Street on the

south, Glenwood Avenue on the east and Ward Street on the west. The area includes all of two blocks and parts of three others.

Joseph Auriemma, a consultant to the township, told the council earlier this year that speedy action is needed to prepare for an anticipated surge in ridership at the NJ Transit railroad station on Lackawanna Plaza.

He said that with the recent initiation of work on the so-called Montclair Connection railroad link, more trains could be diverted to the tracks serving the station next year.

The council has also decided to have the township-owned Royal Theatre torn down to create more parking area in the Center.

Watsessing School bids tearful adieu to principal

A very emotional farewell ceremony honored Watsessing School Principal Darlene Mattia in the school's auditorium on Dec. 13.

Mattia will be retiring when school is closed for the holidays.

Members of the fifth- and sixth-grade chorus sang a specially rewritten version of "So Long, Farewell," as a teary-eyed Mattia received gifts and hugs from many of the children.

"This is a day I'll always remember," said Mattia, who will be leaving after nine years at the school and 34 years in the Bloomfield school system.

The presentation - a surprise to Mattia - followed the school's annual winter concert.

"It is so hard to leave," Mattia said during her final speech. "I love all the children and the staff so much."

A red banner which read "Thank you Mrs. Mattia!" in white balloon letters hung over the stage occupied by the orchestra.

Behind the orchestra, a giant snow-covered rendition of the school blanketed the back wall. Numerous hand-made paper snowflakes dangled from the ceiling.

Ironically, while most of the children were calm and attentive, many parents and teachers in attendance had to fight

"Through the Years" was played on the piano.

Nearly 20 minutes after the assembly had concluded, children were still lining up to say goodbye.

"This is just extraordinary," Mattia said. "It's one of the happiest days of my life."

Mattia's emotions were so high that a box of tissues was already waiting on top of the piano, just in case.

"It's just time to go," she said afterwards. "I've done everything I wanted to do here and now it's time to move on."

"It was a very hard and agonizing decision," Mattia added.

"My husband and I are going to travel and see the world," she said.

"We are going to drive to Florida," she said. "From there, we are heading off on a cruise."

When asked of her favorite activity as a principal, Mattia spoke from her heart.

"My favorite activity," she said, "was being the principal of Watsessing School."
